FUN FACTS

- » December was originally the tenth month of the year in the Roman calendar. It gets its name from the Latin word "decem," which means tenth. However, when the Romans added January and February to the calendar, December became the twelfth month. They still kept its original name.
- » Gone with the Wind premiered at Loew's Grand Theatre in Atlanta, Georgia on December 15, 1939.
- » On December 17, 1903, Orville and Wilbur Wright, two brothers from Dayton, Ohio, ushered in the era of flight, and soared into history. Despite having no formal engineering training, the brothers defied gravity by making the first manned airplane flight in Kitty Hawk, North Carolina.
- » The first artificial Christmas tree was made in Germany, fashioned out of goose feathers that were dyed green!
- » Times Square became the go-to place for New Year's Eve revelers as early as 1904, but it wasn't until December 1907 that the New Year's Eve Ball made its first appearance.
- » The term Yuletide comes from a Norse tradition of cutting and burning a tree to bring in the Winter Solstice. This was to last through 12 days– later known as the 12 days of Christmas.
- » Frank Sinatra was born on December 12, 1915.
- » Illustrations in the first book version of 'A Christmas Carol' published in 1843 included kissing under mistletoe, something thought to have helped popularize the tradition.
- » In the 1790s, George Washington was the first U.S. President to serve eggnog. His recipe contained rum, whiskey, and sherry!
- » "Jingle bells" was composed in 1857, and not for Christmas. It was actually meant to be a Thanksgiving song.
- » The December birthstone is turquoise, and its flowers are the paper-white narcissus, holly, or poinsettia.
- » Christiaan Barnard and his team performed the world's first human-to-human heart transplant operation on December 3, 1967. It was a major historical event and a significant breakthrough for medical science.
- » An ancient legend states that forest animals can speak in the human language on Christmas Eve!
- » December's full moon rises on December 29, 2020. Look for the full moon to appear above the horizon just before sunset.
- » On December 14, 1791, the Bill of Rights was passed.
- » Dr. Pepper, invented by Charles Alderton, was first served on December 1, 1885, at the W.B. Morrison & Co. Old Corner Drug Store in Waco, Texas.
- » On December 2, 1927, The Ford Motor Company unveiled its second mass production model, the Ford Model-A, as its new automobile.

THREE INTERESTING CHRISTMAS TRADITIONS FROM AROUND THE WORLD

1- Hidden Brooms

Did you know that in Norway, people hide their brooms on Christmas Eve? The tradition dates back centuries to when people believed that evil spirits and witches emerged on Christmas Eve, searching for brooms to ride on. To this day, many people in Norway still hide their brooms in the safest spot in the house!

2- Roller Skating to Church

In Caracas, Venezuela, it's a tradition to roller skate to Christmas morning mass! In fact, roads are even blocked off until 8am to allow for this holiday custom to transpire safely.

3- Spiderweb Christmas

Many Ukrainians actually decorate their Christmas trees with artificial spiderwebs and spiders as they are believed to capture good luck, as a web would capture a spider's prey. The tradition is derived from a story about a poor family who woke up to a Christmas tree glittering with webs that turned into silver and gold.


