FUN FACTS

- » November's traditional birthstone is the topaz, usually a yellow or amber color. The ancient Greeks believed that topaz could make a wearer invisible. A symbol of honor and strength, topaz was also believed to bring longevity and wisdom.
- » November 3rd is Sadie Hawkins day.
- » On the night of November 29th–30th, a penumbral eclipse will be visible from North America. Appropriately filtered telescopes or binoculars are necessary for eye-safe viewing.
- » November's birth flower is the chrysanthemum. Generally, chrysanthemums represent cheerfulness. A red one conveys "I love you." White symbolizes truth or pure love, while a yellow one indicates slighted love.
- » November's full moon is traditionally called the Beaver Moon. Why this name? In the Colonial Era, this was the month to set one's beaver traps before the swamps froze and beavers retired to their lodges, to ensure a supply of warm winter furs.
- » According to weather folklore, a heavy November snow will last until April.
- » November, the 11th month of the year, has 30 days and marks the beginning of the winter holiday season for most folks, even if the winter solstice doesn't occur until late December.
- » Children between the ages of 10 and 16 who were born in November, perform significantly better than their peers in areas of stamina, strength, and cardiovascular fitness, one study suggests.
- » The name 'November,' derived from the Latin word novem, means nine. It should have been the ninth month of the year. However, thanks to January and February which were added to the calendar some 2,700 years ago, November is now the 11th guy in the 12 member team.
- » There is no mention of November in any of Shakespeare's works. After 37 plays and 154 sonnets, the greatest writer in English literature did not once mention the month of 'November' in any of his writing. Interesting!
- » According to research, November is considered to be the best time of the year to express love.
- » It is during this month that a majority of Spaniards are more likely to tweet "Te amo" which means "I love you."
- » In the UK, the evening of November 5th is Guy Fawkes Night (or Bonfire Night). Every year, people get together to build bonfires, watch fireworks displays, and remember that on this date in 1605 Guy Fawkes and his fellow Catholic conspirators were discovered and arrested before they could blow up the Houses of Parliament and kill King James with their "Gunpowder Plot."
- » November has two zodiac signs. If you are born before November 23rd, you have the sign of the Scorpio, and if you are born after November 23rd, you have the sign Sagittarius.
- » Thanksgiving is celebrated on the fourth Thursday of November, and has been since 1621. The first Thanksgiving was a feast celebrating the first bountiful harvest of the pilgrims of Plymouth and New England. It is still celebrated in a similar way, with families coming together and sharing plentiful amounts of food traditionally available during November.
- » November 3rd, 1957, was a historic day for both Soviet Russia and the world. It was on this day that the first spacecraft carrying a live passenger was successfully launched into space. The passenger was Laika the dog, an unassuming-looking stray pooch who had been found on the streets of Moscow.
- » November 14th is Diwali, which is an annual festival of lights celebrating the triumph of good over evil.
- » If trees show buds in November, the winter will last until May.
- » Ice in November brings mud in December.

National Jukebox Day!

The name jukebox is thought to have come from places called 'juke houses' or 'jook joints.' In the early 1900s, people congregated inside these establishments to drink and listen to music. By the 1960s, designs had been upgraded to coin-operated models that could accommodate larger selections of songs. The jukebox has such a special place in history.

A History of Veterans Day— Honoring Those Who Have Served

A National Holiday

Veterans Day actually originated as "Armistice Day" on November 11th, 1919. That day marks the anniversary of the ending of World War I. Congress passed a resolution in 1926 marking an annual observance, and then November 11th became a national holiday in 1938. Unlike Memorial Day, the Veterans Day holiday pays tribute to all American veterans– living and dead– but gives special thanks to living veterans who served our country honorably during war or peacetime.





Facts about Veterans Day

Here are a few facts about this incredibly special holiday that you may or may not already know.

- » Veterans Day occurs on November 11th each year in honor of "the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month" in 1918, which marked the end of World War I —initially termed "Armistice Day."
- » The holiday commemorates the service of veterans of all wars.
- » In 1954, Eisenhower officially changed the name of the holiday from Armistice Day to Veterans Day.
- » In 1968, Congress passed a bill which moved the celebration of Veterans Day to the fourth Monday in October; however, due to the historical significance of the date, in 1975, President Ford moved the holiday back to November 11th.
- » In Great Britain and the Commonwealth countries, it's customary to observe two minutes of silence at 11 a.m. every November 11th.

Did you know that ...?

- » 9% of veterans are women.
- » 18.2 million living veterans served during at least one war as of the year 2018.
- » As of 2019, the three states with the highest percentage of veterans were Virginia, Wyoming, and Alaska.
- » 7 million veterans served during the Vietnam War, 2 million during the Korean War, and 3 million in the War on Terrorism.




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
